Mt Etna Caving (5-7 October)

The closest caving to Mackay is the Mt Etna region just north of Rockhampton. For the long week end in October, a few of the Mackay cavers headed down for the weekend. Damien Tapp, Philip Morgan and myself were joined by one of our Mackay rock climbing buddies Thomas Withers, Ray Deasy from Bundaberg and Paco Murray made the drive up from Brisbane.

On Saturday we visited Jolly Roger (E29) on the western flank of Mt Etna. We got a relatively late start to the day waiting for everyone to arrive from near and far. I have previously been in the entrance series of Jolly Roger but other than that, the cave was new to all of us.

We expected from the literature that there would be a pitch in the order of 30m, and sure enough there was. Two deviations later, our party of six made it to the bottom of the pitch. We continued to explore further passage, descending another short pitch and exploring some lower passage.

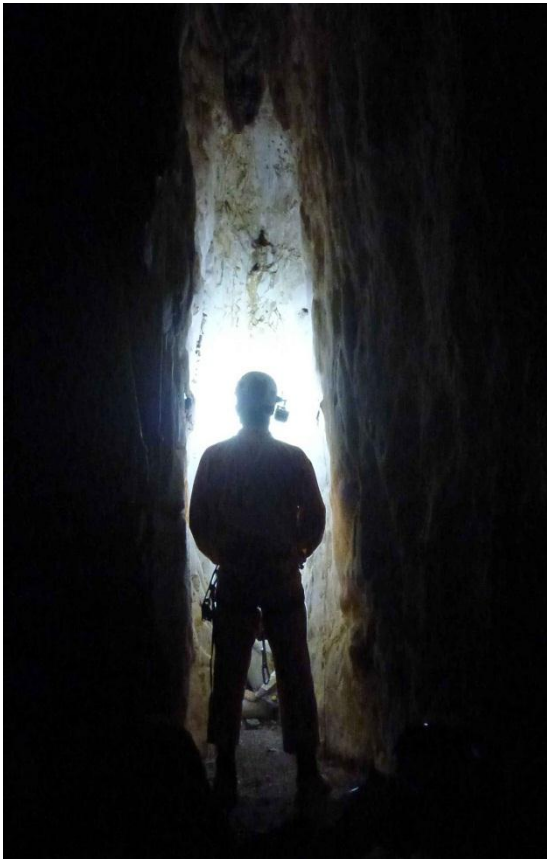
On our exit from the cave, through some loose material in the entrance series, Paco's helmet did good duty absorbing a football sized headplant. Our final exit from the cave was just after dark.

On Sunday we returned to the west flank of Mt Etna to visit Tardis (a new untagged cave). Despite several visits to this cave over the last six or seven years, we have yet to produce a decent survey and planned to put that to bed. The confined nature of this cave took its toll, with some struggling through the squeeze at the head of the first pitch, and one member resigning themselves that the squeeze was one size too small for them.

Mt Etna Caving (19-20 October)

The first pitch is around 25m and leads into a larger chamber. The way on from here is through an insane squeeze while on rope into the top of a small bell shaped chamber. I have done this twice before, but today was not my day for it, and the others were happy to leave it go. We did survey this cave to the bottom some years ago and calculated a depth of 57m, but there were some issues with the original survey that we wanted to address before drawing up the cave. This cave is quite difficult with the second squeeze being a serious obstacle to the bottom section of the cave.

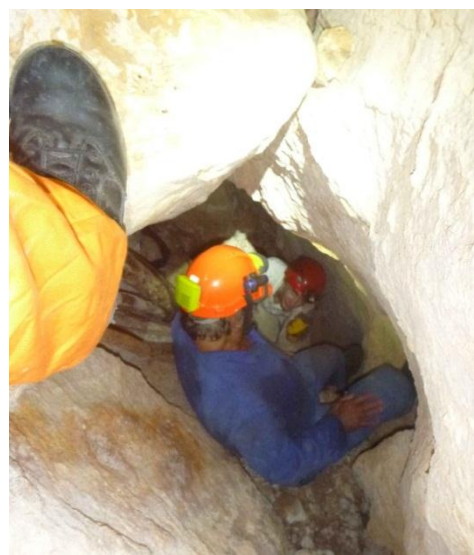
Paco and Ray couldn't stay for caving on Monday. Damien, Thomas, Philip and myself headed up the track from the Cammoo Caves entrance to the National Park in search of Beehive Cave (J18). I have visited this caves several times in the past, but in recent times the entrance has eluded me. A fresh start this time and we found the entrance quickly. A confined entrance leads to a chimney down of about 8m, then an awkward squeeze leads into the main chamber. Whilst this is not an extensive cave, it is quite rewarding to visit.

This was meant to be a week end with some of the SES vertical rescue people from Mackay, with a rescue exercise thrown in. In the end, the SES people were a no show with Peter Bennett being the only representative. With a very different group the dynamic plans for the week end changed considerably from the original.

For this week end, we had three of the Lambert family (old caving friends but novices to CCC), Thomas Withers, Ray Deasy and my wife Kerry. On Saturday morning we visited Main Cave on Mt Etna. This involves the walk up the civilised track more or less to the top of the mountain and down to Bat Cleft (E6) entrance, and then back down to the foot of the mountain again. Main Cave (E1) is quite extensive for the area. Although there are some vertical entrances, the cave is usually down without any rope work, and a fun and rewarding round trip can be done which involves a healthy mix of crawls, climbs, chimneys and the like.

We hadn't abandoned a rescue practice altogether, and went from Main Cave to Carn Dum (E15). For those who are not familiar with Mt Etna, there are quite a few caves within close distance of each other. We rigged the pitch going in from the middle entrance.

This is a pitch of about 25m. By the time we rigged and got everyone down we realised that time was getting away on us, and we had to chose between further exploration of the cave and a rescue practice.

We opted for the rescue practice, and all but the victim and her attendant ascended to the top of the pitch. We were planning to haul them both together using a counterbalance system. I'll spare all the details, but we used an inverted SRT Autostop descender as a holding device, and I attempted to haul using a counterbalance arrangement over the pitch. We eventually raised the victim and attendant about 6 or 7 metres, but progress was too slow and we lowered the victim and attendant back down.

We then went to the top of the pitch and set up a hauling system there and with an additional operator hauled the “victim” with the attendant ascending under their own steam. We learned a lot from the exercise.

Perhaps one of the more important lessons was that efficiency is just as important in a hauling rig as it is in a prusiking rig. That is, looking at where purchase gained is lost before the holding system holds. The exercise chewed up a lot of time, and it was after dark when we exited the cave.

Ray had to head off early, and the rest of us on Sunday headed off for a reprise of Beehive Cave. In the end, only Thomas, Telina and myself made it down the entrance chimney, and enjoyed a leisurely visit to the main chamber of the cave, just relaxing, chatting and taking in the ambience of the chamber.

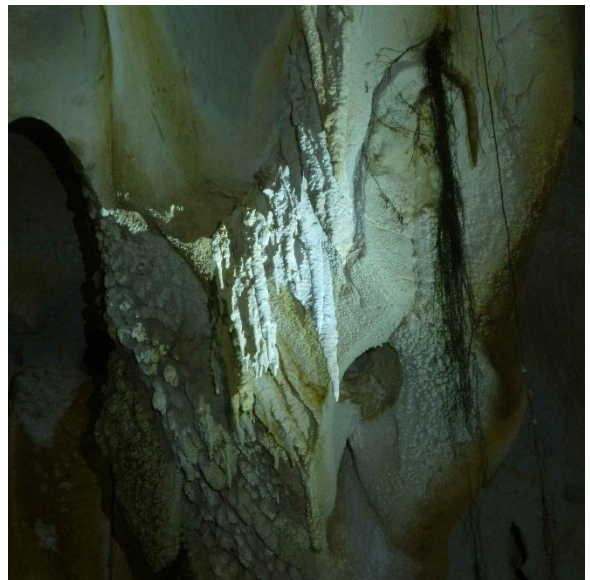

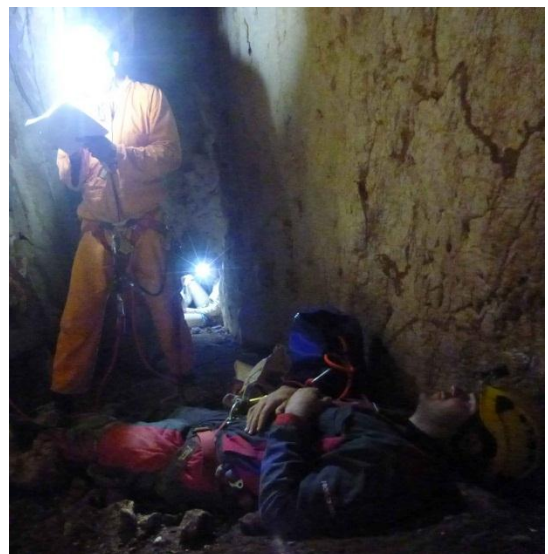

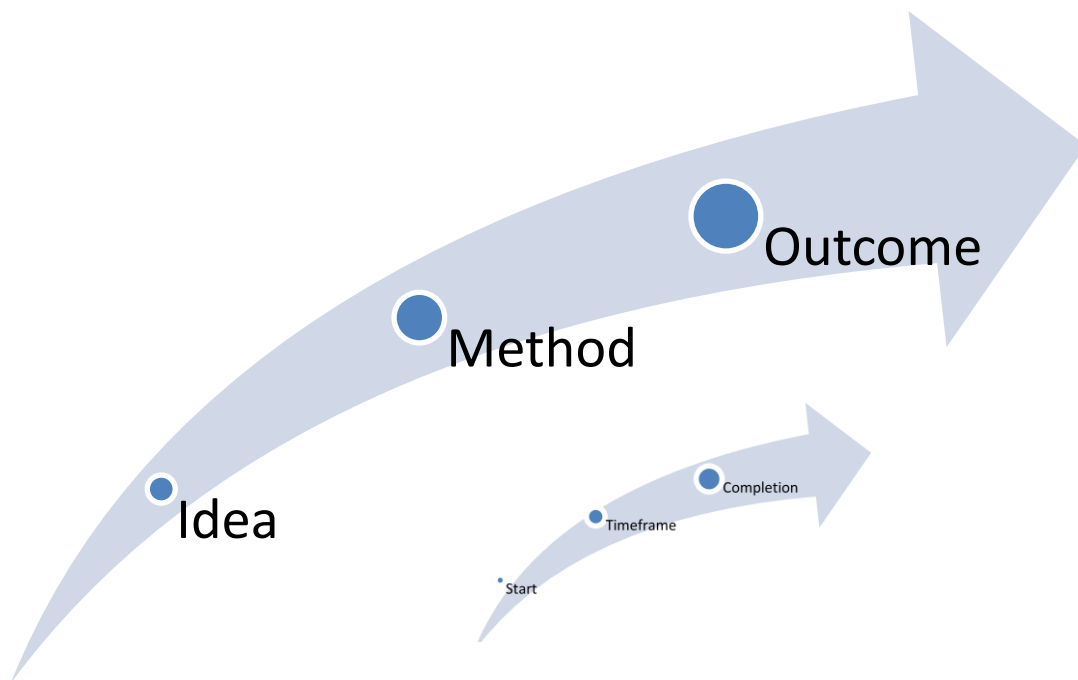
